



Mark A. Luz is General Counsel in the Trade Law Bureau (JLT), a joint division of Global Affairs Canada and the Department of Justice, where he is responsible for leading the Government of Canada's defense in international arbitrations involving foreign investors under Canada's free trade and investment treaties. Mark has also acted as legal advisor in many of Canada's free trade and investment agreement negotiations and advises the Government of Canada on compliance with international trade and investment obligations, including the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), Canada-United States-Mexico Free Trade Agreement (CUSMA), the Canada-EU Free Trade Agreement (CETA), the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP), as well as under the World Trade Organization (WTO).

Prior to joining the Government of Canada, Mark A. Luz was Senior Associate in the New York and Moscow offices of White & Case LLP practicing international arbitration, litigation and corporate law from 2000-2009. While at White & Case, Mark represented corporations and sovereign governments in oil and gas, power, telecommunications, financial and other disputes and corporate transactions around the world, and was active in pro bono causes, including at the European Court of Human Rights.

Mark A. Luz is a regular speaker at conferences and universities around the world and was Lecturer in international investment law at the Queen's University Faculty of Law in 2018. Mark is currently the Chair of the Board of Directors of the International Law Students Association and has been an active volunteer with the Philip C. Jessup International Law Moot Court Competition for twenty years, including as National Administrator for the Jessup competition in Brazil and in Russia.

Mark A. Luz is a member of the ICC Canada Arbitration Committee and is past-President of the Young Canadian Arbitration Practitioners (YCAP). Educated in both common law and civil law, Mark is a graduate of McGill University (B.A., LL.B., B.C.L., Great Distinction, Maxwell Cohen Prize for International Law) and the University of Chicago (M.A., Hons.) and is admitted to the Law Society of Ontario and the New York State Bar.
